WORKING PROJECTS

“The Language of Modeling: A Synchronizing Framework for Theory, Statistics, and Research Methods.”

This solo-authored paper proposes a simple, non-obtrusive framework for use in undergraduate sociology courses to add cohesion to these typical core courses; and thread research and theory through the curriculum. Intended for publication at Teaching Sociology

“Regulatory Dynamics and Industry Demographics: Organizational Vitality in US Comic Book Publishers, 1933-2002.”

This solo-authored project is a multi-level examination of comic book publishers in the United States, examining the effect of self-regulation on the numbers and size of comic book publishers and the resulting changes in numbers and forms of comic books via the use of multi-level time-series modeling.

“Diverging Densities and Organizational Concentration in a Measured Resource Space: Firm and Establishment Ecologies in the Arizona Funeral Home Industry, 1968-1999.”

This solo-authored project is an examination of distinctions between firm and establishment forms of organizational relative to processes of success, failure, and market concentration within the death care industry utilizing time-series and event-history regression techniques.

“Embedded Ecology: The Impact of Population Migration on the Organizational Demography of Funeral Homes.”

This solo-authored project examines the effect of migration patterns on organizational vitality via the use of ecological modeling that considers migratory populations as a dynamic resource space such that the transient quality of the resources, not just the absolute volume of resources, alters the competitive structure of the niche and affects the demography of firms and establishments.

“The Importance of Lists: Techniques for Incorporating Statistics into Lower- and Upper-Division Sociology Courses.”

This solo-authored project reviews my use of existing complete, time-series database as a tool for teaching methods of time-series and categorical data analysis to undergraduate students. This project stems from my teaching efforts, has been presented at national conferences, and is ultimately intended for publication in Sociological Spectrum.

“Spaghetti and Meatballs: The Use of Comedy in Italian Westerns, 1960 – 1979.”

This solo-authored project examines the relative frequency of the production of western films, and specifically those with comedic elements, in Italy and the US from 1960-1979, using the theory and schema of Will Wright’s analysis of US western cinema as a basis for analysis.

This co-authored project integrates notions of entrepreneurial activity within the context of resource dependent theories of industrial development by examining an emergent field operating within a distinct geographically and politically limited area.
