1. (20 points) Let $A \in \mathbb{R}^{3 \times 3}$ be given by

$$A = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & -1 & 1 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 \end{bmatrix}.$$

(a) (5 points) (Short Answer) What is the range of A ?

$$\text{Span} \left\{ \begin{bmatrix} 1 \\ 0 \\ 0 \end{bmatrix}, \begin{bmatrix} 1 \\ 1 \\ 0 \end{bmatrix} \right\}$$

(b) (5 points) (Short Answer) What is the dimension of the null-space of A ?

$$1.$$

(c) (5 points) Is A an orthogonal projection?

No, not symmetric

(d) (5 points) (Short Answer) What is the smallest singular values of A ?

0, the matrix is not full rank.

2. (20 points) Let $Q \in \mathbb{R}^n$ be a unitary matrix.

(a) (5 points) (Short Answer) What do you know about Q^{-1} ?

$$Q^{-1} = Q^*$$

(b) (5 points) Show for all $\vec{x}, \vec{y} \in \mathbb{R}^n$ that $(Q\vec{x})^T(Q\vec{y}) = \vec{x}^T\vec{y}$.

$$\begin{aligned}(Q\vec{x})^T(Q\vec{y}) &= \vec{x}^T Q^T Q \vec{y} \\ &= \vec{x}^T \vec{y}\end{aligned}$$

(c) (5 points) Show for all $\vec{x} \in \mathbb{R}^n$ that $\|Q\vec{x}\|_2 = \|\vec{x}\|_2$.

$$\|Q\vec{x}\|_2 = ((Q\vec{x})^T Q\vec{x})^{1/2} = (\vec{x}^T \vec{x})^{1/2} = \|\vec{x}\|_2$$

(d) (5 points) (Short Answer:) What is $\|Q\|_2$?

$$\|Q\|_2 = \max_{\|\vec{x}\|=1} \frac{\|Q\vec{x}\|}{\|\vec{x}\|} = \max_{\|\vec{x}\|=1} \frac{\|\vec{x}\|}{\|\vec{x}\|} = 1.$$

3. (15 points) Let $\vec{a}, \vec{b}, \vec{v}, \vec{w} \in \mathbb{R}^n$ be vectors with components:

$$\vec{a} = \begin{bmatrix} a_1 \\ \vdots \\ a_i \\ \vdots \\ a_n \end{bmatrix}, \quad \vec{b} = \begin{bmatrix} b_1 \\ \vdots \\ b_i \\ \vdots \\ b_n \end{bmatrix}, \quad \vec{v} = \begin{bmatrix} v_1 \\ \vdots \\ v_i \\ \vdots \\ v_n \end{bmatrix}, \quad \vec{w} = \begin{bmatrix} w_1 \\ \vdots \\ w_i \\ \vdots \\ w_n \end{bmatrix}.$$

Let $A \in \mathbb{R}^{n \times n}$ be defined by $A = \vec{a}\vec{v}^T + \vec{b}\vec{w}^T$.

(a) (5 points) For $1 \leq j \leq n$, what is column j of A ?

$$A\vec{e}_j = \vec{a}v_j + \vec{b}w_j$$

(b) (5 points) What is the rank of A ?

(c) (5 points) What is the range of A ?

$\text{span}\{\vec{a}, \vec{b}\}$.

4. (15 points) Let

$$\vec{a}_1 = \begin{bmatrix} 1 \\ 1 \\ 0 \end{bmatrix}, \vec{a}_2 = \begin{bmatrix} 0 \\ 1 \\ 1 \end{bmatrix}.$$

Find orthonormal vectors $\vec{q}_1, \vec{q}_2 \in \mathbb{R}^3$ such that $\text{span}\{\vec{q}_1, \vec{q}_2\} = \text{span}\{\vec{a}_1, \vec{a}_2\}$.

$$\vec{q}_1 = \begin{bmatrix} \frac{1}{\sqrt{2}} \\ \frac{1}{\sqrt{2}} \\ 0 \end{bmatrix}.$$

$$\vec{a}_2 = r_{12} \vec{q}_1 + r_{22} \vec{q}_2$$

$$r_{12} = \langle \vec{q}_1, \vec{a}_2 \rangle = \frac{1}{\sqrt{2}}$$

$$\Rightarrow r_{22} = \|\vec{a}_2 - r_{12} \vec{q}_1\|$$

$$= \left\| \begin{bmatrix} 0 \\ 1 \\ 1 \end{bmatrix} - \frac{1}{\sqrt{2}} \begin{bmatrix} \frac{1}{\sqrt{2}} \\ \frac{1}{\sqrt{2}} \\ 0 \end{bmatrix} \right\|$$

$$= \left\| \begin{bmatrix} -\frac{1}{2} \\ \frac{1}{2} \\ 1 \end{bmatrix} \right\|$$

$$= \frac{\sqrt{6}}{2}$$


$$\Rightarrow \vec{q}_2 = \begin{bmatrix} -\frac{1}{\sqrt{6}} \\ \frac{1}{\sqrt{6}} \\ \frac{2}{\sqrt{6}} \end{bmatrix}.$$

5. (10 points) Find the SVD of the following matrix:

$$A = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 3 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & -2 \end{bmatrix}.$$

$$A = \begin{bmatrix} 0 & 0 & 1 \\ 1 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 1 & 0 \end{bmatrix} \begin{bmatrix} 3 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 2 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix} \begin{bmatrix} 0 & 1 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \\ 1 & 0 & 0 \end{bmatrix}.$$

6. (10 points) The figure below is the image of the unit ball under a matrix $A \in \mathbb{R}^2$:



If the SVD of A is given by $A = U\Sigma V^*$. Find possible matrices for U , Σ and V or explain why it is not possible to determine these matrices.

$$\Sigma = \begin{bmatrix} 3 & 0 \\ 0 & 2 \end{bmatrix}, U = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 \\ 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}, V \text{ cannot determine.}$$

7. (10 points) For students who are not MST graduate students.

Suppose $\vec{x} \in \mathbb{R}^n$. Pick one and only one of the following statements to prove. Circle the one you chose to prove.

- $\|\vec{x}\|_2 \leq \sqrt{n} \|\vec{x}\|_\infty$.

- $\|\vec{x}\|_\infty \leq \|\vec{x}\|_2$.

- $\|\vec{x}\|_2 \leq \left(\sum_{i=1}^n \|\vec{x}\|_\infty^2 \right)^{1/2} = \sqrt{n} \cdot \|\vec{x}\|_\infty$

- $\|\vec{x}\|_2 = \left(\sum_{i=1}^n x_i^2 \right)^{1/2} \geq \left(\|\vec{x}\|_\infty^2 \right)^{1/2} = \|\vec{x}\|_\infty$.

8. (10 points) For MST graduate students only. Other students can do this problem for potential bonus points.

Let $\vec{u}, \vec{v} \in \mathbb{R}^n$ and define $A \in \mathbb{R}^{n \times n}$ by $A = \vec{u}\vec{v}^T$.

- (a) (5 points) Prove that $\|A\vec{x}\|_2 \leq \|\vec{u}\|_2 \|\vec{v}\|_2 \|\vec{x}\|_2$.

$$\begin{aligned} \|A\vec{x}\|_2 &= \|\vec{u}\vec{v}^T\vec{x}\|_2 \\ &= |\vec{v}^T\vec{x}| \cdot \|\vec{u}\|_2 \\ &\leq \|\vec{v}\|_2 \cdot \|\vec{x}\|_2 \cdot \|\vec{u}\|_2. \end{aligned}$$

- (b) (5 points) Prove that $\|A\|_2 = \|\vec{u}\|_2 \|\vec{v}\|_2$.

Let $\vec{x} = \frac{\vec{v}}{\|\vec{v}\|}$. Then,

$$\begin{aligned} \|A\vec{x}\|_2 &= \left\| \vec{u} \cdot \frac{\vec{v}^T \vec{v}}{\|\vec{v}\|} \right\| \\ &= \|\vec{u}\|_2 \cdot \|\vec{v}\|_2^2 / \|\vec{v}\|_2 = \|\vec{u}\|_2 \cdot \|\vec{v}\|_2 \end{aligned}$$

Therefore, by part a:

$$\max_{\|\vec{x}\|=1} \frac{\|A\vec{x}\|_2}{\|\vec{x}\|_2} = \|\vec{u}\|_2 \cdot \|\vec{v}\|_2.$$
