




Openness Index




FREE TRADE AGREEMENTS

- Joined GATT (General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade) in 1986
- 12 FTAs with 44 countries
- NAFTA in 1994 with USA and Canada
- G-3 in 1995 with Colombia and Venezuela (VZLA left in 2006)
- FTAs with Costa Rica (1995), Bolivia (1995), Nicaragua (1998), Chile (1999),
 EU (2000), Israel (2000), Uruguay (2004), and Japan (2005)
- TN FTA 2001 with Guatemala, El Salvador, and Honduras
- EFTA 2001 with Iceland, Norway, Liechtenstein, and Switzerland




Trade Balance with South America (FTA's) in \$ billions




Trade Balance with Central America (FTA's) in \$ billions




Mexico's Top 5 Export Destinations



Mexico's Top 5 Import Origins





Trade Balance with Top 5 Partners (in \$ millions)



Chinese Trade Growth


- Goods
 - Natural resources- Metals and Oil going to China

Chinese Consumer Electronics & Parts


- In 2013 China exported 45.6% of the world's cellphones

- In 2015 Mexico's 4th most imported product (by total value) was cellphones


Top 5 Exported Commodities






Top Mexican Exports to Canada




Top Mexican Imports from Canada




Top Mexican Exports to USA (Total Trade Value)

MEXICO AND USA: MOVING FORWARD?

- Continue and build upon crude oil swaps with USA
- Seek potential investments for infrastructure upgrades and new oil reserve exploration
 - Only 20% of Mexico has been extensively explored for reserves
- Capitalize on other available US markets through FDI, much like automanufacturing industry



Imports of Vehicle parts from US, Canada and Germany as a % of the World




AUTOMOTIVE VEHICLE TRADE (WITH USA)

- Because US is such a crucial trade partner, we single out US and analyze the US-Mexico auto trade in depth.
- 2nd Finding: Mexico imports car parts from the US and exports assembled/finished cars back to the US.

Auto Parts as a % of Total vehicle (Trade with USA)








TWO CLUSTERS OF AUTOMOTIVE INDUSTRY

- Northern region (maquiladoras)
 - Characterized by high <u>employment</u>
 - Human capital: abundant <u>low-skill workers</u>
 - Geographical location: close to the US
- Central region
 - Characterized by high <u>value added</u>
 - Human Capital: most <u>educated workforce</u> in the country—critical source of engineers, designers, and other high-skill workers
 - Logistics: Efficient transportation system—highway, airports, and ports
 - Geographical location: close to Mexico City

MAQUILADORAS

- Maquiladoras are factories in Mexico that import raw materials on a duty-free and tariff-free basis and export assembled/manufactured goods back to the USA.
- They concentrate on the US-Mexico border

REASONS FOR SUCCESS OF MAQUILADORAS

- #1: Advantageous geographical location—low transportation cost to the US
- #2: Trade policies: NAFTA fueled maquiladoras since 1994. Under NAFTA rules, as long as final products are sold in the US, the owners of maquiladoras don't pay duty on imports from the US.
- #3: Low labor cost—allowed US companies to produce goods at competitive prices
- #4: Specialization—relatively high quality

RECOMMENDATION

Gradually reduce dependence on US market conditions

- Diversify exporting countries in new markets of Central and South America
- Eliminating or reducing customs duties in South American countries
- Leverage strategic position to attract FDI from auto firms from Europe and Japan

Shift away from maquiladora-led to more sustainable model of development

- The automotive cluster in central Mexico has grown to include higher value activities such as engineering and design
- Northern maquiladoras are losing competitive advantage due to alternative sources of cheap labor

Stability is good for business

- Improve security and stability in some states
- Actively fight corruption
- Address anti-competitive concerns





Quantity of Mexican Beer Exported (liters)




GRUPO MODELO

Premier Mexican beer company since 1925

- Dominates Mexican beer industry
 - >60% of Mexican Beer Industry (Other major player, FEMSA)
 - 80% of Mexican Beer Exports
- Most successful beer
 - Corona Extra
 - Modelo Especial
 - Corona Light

CORONA

- #1 Mexican beer exported (Roughly 150 countries)
- Began its "Vacation in a Bottle" Campaign in 1988
- Surpassed Heineken as #1 imported beer in the U.S.A in 1997
- Enjoyed annual sales growth 1991-2006
- Acquired by Anheuser-Busch in 2006
